

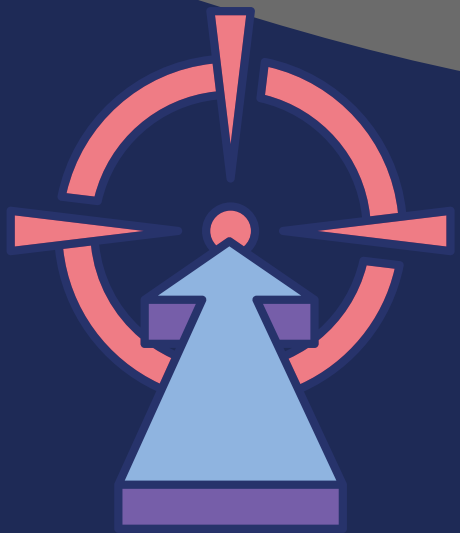

CONNECTIVITY AND DEVICE ACCESS ARE NOT EQUAL

- While many students have access to district-issued devices, some still rely on shared home devices or smartphones.
- Consider building assignments that allow for flexibility: mobile-friendly platforms, downloadable resources, and low-bandwidth options help ensure equitable participation.
- Collaborate with librarians to identify students with limited access and find alternative formats or times for digital access (e.g., library-based work time or device checkouts).

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STUDENTS NEED DIGITAL NAVIGATION SKILLS

- Having a device doesn't mean students know how to use it academically.
- Partner with your librarian to co-teach research skills, evaluate sources, and organize information digitally.
- Incorporate lessons on email etiquette, using learning management systems, and organizing files — especially for younger or less experienced students.

INSTRUCTIONAL TECHNOLOGY WORKS BEST WHEN IT'S INTENTIONAL

- Not every tech tool improves learning; use vetted, district-supported resources and align them with your learning goals.
- The Innovative Learning Team and your campus librarian can help identify tools that balance engagement with instructional rigor.

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DIGITAL CITIZENSHIP IS A SHARED RESPONSIBILITY

- Students benefit when consistent expectations are set across classrooms and throughout the campus.
- Work with librarians and campus tech leads to incorporate digital citizenship lessons into advisory, core classes, or library orientations.
- The district provides guidelines and lessons on topics like cyberbullying, plagiarism, online safety, and digital footprints.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT IS ONGOING AND COLLABORATIVE

- Consider inviting your librarian into PLCs to co-plan lessons involving digital tools or research-based projects.
